The Council asked the Town Manager to seek additional information from Mr. Eckelmeyer on when the Board meets and how often, for future discussion.

The Council was previously approached by Ed Eckelmeyer and asked to consider appointing a liaison to the Groton Community Boating Club Board of Advisors. No Town funds are donated to this program. Mr. Eckelmeyer asked for seed money to be included in this year's budget, but that was not considered by the Council. Phil Butta noted that he has been involved with the club and has facilitated a meeting of those interested in using the facility and taking advantage of the waterfront access at the Spicer House. Mr. Butta has encouraged the club to go out and find some funding on their own in keeping with Parks and Recreation's philosophy that programs geared toward adults should pay for their own operational costs. The club has been asked to put together a business plan and to identify equipment needs. Mr. Eckelmeyer's request for a liaison is as a private individual; the idea was not discussed by the Board. Mr. Butta suggested that a liaison would help the Council to understand the group.

Mayor Watson suggested that the group needs to get more organized and perhaps adopt some bylaws. Mr. Lokken noted that the group is knowledgeable about boating, but getting them to broaden their vision and look at larger issues has been difficult.

Councilor Schmidt stated she would be interested in acting as the liaison to the group.

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Justice will provide funding to municipal police departments to purchase specialized, covert audio and video recording equipment for the investigation of crimes involving illegal trading in firearms and narcotics, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Groton will collaborate with State and Federal law enforcement to prevent the proliferation of firearms among drug dealers and gang members, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that Town Manager Mark R. Oefinger may apply for a grant of \$9,600 from the U.S.

Department of Justice Project Safe Neighborhood/Gang funding initiative.

2008-0224 Relocation of Roller Hockey Rink Referral

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING RELOCATION OF THE ROLLER HOCKEY RINK

WHEREAS, the Groton Senior Center expansion project is scheduled to begin shortly, which will necessitate the relocation of the Town's roller hockey rink to make room for an expanded Senior Center parking lot, and

WHEREAS, the Town Council has considered several alternative locations for the roller hockey rink facility, and

WHEREAS, roller hockey is a highly popular recreation program that should be allowed to go on with as little interruption as possible, and

WHEREAS, relocating the roller hockey rink south of its current location, toward the Groton Public Library, will allow for prompt restoration of play, and will only impact a low-use/sub-par soccer field, and

WHEREAS, the Town Council recognizes that not all of the funding for relocating the rink has been determined at this time, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Council authorizes the relocation of the roller hockey rink south of its current location as soon as feasible.

Gary Schneider, John Silsby, Jerry Lokken and Phil Butta were present to address the Council. The Town Manager noted that the plans for the Senior Center will require the relocation of the roller hockey rink and staff is looking for input from the Council on potential sites. The Town Manager would prefer a permanent location and feels that this use would be good at a larger recreational facility as opposed to being a stand-alone use.

Mr. Schneider explained that staff looked at all Town-owned land. The rink requires a 100' x 85' asphalt pad. Three sites are recommended for further consideration: 1) the existing site, but closer to the Library; 2) the Copp property; and 3) the Esker Point Beach parking lot. There are plusses and minuses to all sites. All are stand alone sites that do not offer any night lighting.

Councilor O'Beirne asked about estimated costs by site. He also suggested that the Council hold a public hearing to solicit comments from users of the rink.

As a user of the program, Mr. Butta offered the following observations. He noted that the hockey program started in 1985 at Esker Point Beach. The rink was subsequently obtained from Connecticut College. Mr. Butta noted that the rink is used by all age groups and it is a family program. It is a unique facility in this area and an asset to the Town. The bottom line from the users is they want to be able to play and they do not want the rink to go away. They are also willing to make sacrifices such as the special surface coating to keep the rink operational. Users are comfortable with the library site. Mr. Butta suggested that the soccer field that will be lost at the Library is not a good field and is a safety hazard. The Copp property would be a great site, but it may not be financially realistic at this time.

Mr. Silsby noted that the roller hockey programs start in mid-spring and run into late fall and the desire was to

take the rink out of service over the winter and have it back up for the start of the program. The closer the relocation site the easier it is to move.

Councilor Sheets noted her concerns with the Copp property and Esker Point Beach because of the loss of parking. She expressed her preference for the Library site. Councilor O'Beirne asked if Mr. Butta has any concerns with the need for transportation to the Copp property or Esker Point Beach. Mr. Butta stated that most users drive or have transportation so the location is not an issue.

Councilor Brown-Tracy left the meeting.

Councilor Bond supports keeping the rink at the Library site for now, but would like to see it eventually moved to the Copp property. If the soccer field at the Library will be lost, she would like to confirm that there will be another soccer field provided at the Merritt property. The Town Manager noted that removing the temporary parking lot on the Merritt property and leveling that area is part of the plan, but what the ultimate condition will be compared to what is at the Library is unknown. Councilor Bond requested a referral to the Committee of the Whole on the Merritt property field and the Mayor made the referral.

Councilor Monteiro asked how much the baseball field at Farquhar Park is used. Mr. Lokken noted that there are many contracts for the field. It is not a premium field, but it is being used.

The consensus of the Committee of the Whole was to support relocating the roller hockey rink closer to the Library.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING HUNTING ON TOWN PROPERTY

WHEREAS, from time to time, the Town Council has received requests from persons who wish to

hunt on Town property, including bow hunting as well as with firearms, and

WHEREAS, the Town Council recognizes that hunting is popular and traditional and that most hunters carefully observe the best safety practices, and

WHEREAS, with an over-riding concern for the safety of all persons who may be on or near town properties, the Town Council has considered the other recreational uses of both open and forested town property, along with such factors as the proximity of homes and the widespread, year-round use of many town properties for non-hunting forms of recreation, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that it is the policy of the Groton Town Council that hunting by any means is not to be permitted on town properties.

RESOLUTIONS APPROVING AMOUNT OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO BE SOLD

WHEREAS, the Town of Groton authorized \$26,100,000 school bonds for a new elementary school (Catherine Kolnaski Elementary School) pursuant to Ordinance No. 258, and

WHEREAS, \$350,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$5,005,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2005, of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$25,750,000, and

WHEREAS, \$6,000,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$16,570,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2006, of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds and the receipt of grants in the amount of \$859,791, the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$18,890,209, and

WHEREAS, \$1,500,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$15,500,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2007 (Lot A), of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds and the receipt of grants in the amount of \$12,424,258, the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$5,825,742, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 258 authorizes the Town Council to determine the amount of bonds to be sold, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that \$1,500,000 bonds be sold pursuant to said Ordinance.

WHEREAS, the Town of Groton authorized \$20,800,000 school bonds for a new elementary school on the site of the former Freeman-Hathaway Elementary School (Northeast Academy) pursuant to Ordinance No. 259, and

WHEREAS, \$310,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$5,005,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2005, of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$20,490,000, and

WHEREAS, \$4,000,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$16,570,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2006, of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds and the receipt of grants in the amount of \$749,460 the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$15,740,540, and

WHEREAS, \$3,200,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$15,500,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2007 (Lot A), of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds and the receipt of grants in the amount of \$9,193,506 the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$4,096,494, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 259 authorizes the Town Council to determine the amount of bonds to be sold, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that \$600,000 bonds be sold pursuant to said Ordinance.

WHEREAS, the Town of Groton authorized \$45,000,000 school bonds for Phase I of renovations and additions to Fitch High School pursuant to Ordinance No. 260, and

WHEREAS, \$640,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$5,005,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2005, of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$44,360,000, and

WHEREAS, \$5,000,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$16,570,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2006, of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds and the receipt of grants in the amount of \$1,464,674, the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$37,895,326, and

WHEREAS, \$10,750,000 principal amount of such bonds were sold as part of \$15,500,000 General Obligation Bonds, Issue of 2007 (Lot A), of the Town, and upon the issuance of such bonds and the receipt of grants in the amount of \$9,355,004, the total amount of such bonds remaining authorized but unissued was reduced to \$19,254,996, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 260 authorizes the Town Council to determine the amount of bonds to be sold, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that \$1,000,000 bonds be sold pursuant to said Ordinance.

WHEREAS, the Town of Groton authorized \$1,385,000 general purpose bonds for design and construction of a replacement Animal Shelter pursuant to Ordinance No. 271, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 271 authorizes the Town Council to determine the amount of bonds to be sold, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that \$1,200,000 bonds be sold pursuant to said Ordinance.
